

Information about your Syringe Driver and Locked box

What is a syringe driver?

A syringe driver is a small, portable, battery-operated pump. It allows medicines to be given steadily under the skin over 24 hours. **IT SHOULD NEVER BE ALLOWED TO GET WET.**

Your syringe driver consists of:

- A battery-operated pump.
- A syringe full of medication diluted with water or saline connected to thin plastic tubing.
- A small needle (cannula) attached to the end of the tubing. This will be inserted under the skin.
- A clear dressing to hold the cannula in place. This needs to be kept clean and dry.
- A clear box to keep the syringe driver safe. This is locked.
- A bag to keep your pump safe and allow you to move around.

Your syringe driver and locked box will look like this:

Why do I need a syringe driver?

A syringe driver is used to give medications in a simple way to help control any symptoms you may be suffering with

For example, if you:

- are feeling or being sick.
- have difficulties swallowing.
- may be too weak or ill to take medicines by mouth.
- you may not absorb medication so well by mouth
- your clinician feels it is the most appropriate route for medication delivery.

The benefits are:

- It will help to maintain a constant amount of drugs in your bloodstream. It will mean that you do not have to keep having injections.
- Having a syringe driver should not stop you from moving about if able or get in your way if you are in bed.
- Medications are better absorbed and so more effective at controlling symptoms.

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Where the small plastic tube can be inserted under the skin, shown in the picture below

Please inform your nurse if:

- The site where the cannula (needle) has been inserted is red, swollen or painful. Having a syringe driver should be painless
- The light on the pump is not flashing or the pump is not working (a whirring sound should be heard every few minutes).
- It does not help to improve your symptoms, e.g., you still have pain or feel sick.
- The plastic cannula falls out.
- The pump gets wet as it is not water or shower-proof. If you wish to shower or bath with your pump, then please discuss this with your nurse

- If you drop your syringe driver. Using the carry bag provided can help keep your syringe driver safe from falling.
- If you have any concerns or worries about having a syringe driver, please discuss these with your Nurse or Doctor

- If the alarm goes off

If you are discharged with a Syringe Driver, your Community Nurse will visit you daily to change the syringe and check your Syringe Driver.
