

The Jelly Belly Test for Outpatients



This test is done to show the size and shape of the organs inside your tummy.
It is also called an ultrasound scan.



The jelly belly test uses sound waves which make pictures on the computer screen.

The picture shows the doctor what is going on inside your tummy.



Amy is 5 years old and today she is going to have the jelly belly test because she has had tummy ache recently.

She has asked her mum to come with her.

His job is to look at the

First the doctor puts some clear jelly onto Amy's bare tummy.

He uses a special camera called a probe to spread the jelly around.

Amy stays as still as a statue while the probe rubs across her tummy. It makes a fuzzy black and white picture come up on the computer screen.

More jelly is put onto Amy's sides to make different pictures come up on the screen.



When the test is finished, Amy sits up and gets lots of tissue paper to wipe the jelly off her tummy.



After the test, Amy got a lovely
sticker and a certificate for
being a star patient.
