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John has hurt his hand falling off his bike. He has been to see the doctor/nurse who says he needs an X-ray.

An X-ray is a special picture which shows the bones in his hand and helps the doctor/nurse make it better.

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This is one of the X-ray rooms, where John will have his picture taken.

The X-ray camera is really big.

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These are 2 of our many Radiographers. Their job is to look after the X-ray equipment and take special pictures needed by the doctor/nurse.

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John's mum can stay with him while he has his X-ray. She has to wear a special coat which is very heavy!

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John has to put his sore hand on a "special board" and keep very still. The Radiographer shines a light over John's hand.

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The Radiographer presses a button and the X-ray machine makes a funny noise.

It does not touch or hurt John.

The Radiographer then checks John's X-ray.

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Once his X-ray is taken, John can have a sticker and a certificate for being an excellent patient.

John will then go back to see the doctor/nurse, who will look at John's X-ray and decide if he has broken any bones.



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
