Smear tests - did you know?

You may have heard cervical screening being called a 'smear test'. This is because when cervical screening first started it involved taking a sample of cells from the cervix and then 'smearing' them onto a slide.

This process worked fine, but it's been very much improved by the introduction of liquid based cytology; where the cells are taken and then the brush is swilled about in a pot of liquid, which fixes the cells and makes sure they are well preserved. This pot can be used to test for HPV, and can be put on a special machine which puts the cells onto a slide in a thin layer so that they can be looked at using a microscope.

Let's break down barriers.
